OPENING KEYNOTE

Cultivating Young Minds:Sharing Authority with Children in Museums

In 2019, the Clyfford Still Museum (CSM) embarked on an ambitious project. CSM staff sought to understand children's perspectives of the collection of Abstract Expressionist works by Still and present them to our community. The 3-year development process, collaborating with over 250 young children and educators across Colorado's Front Range, resulted in an exhibition at the Museum, Clyfford Still, Art, and the Young Mind (on view March-August 2022). Young children ranging in age from 6 months to 8 years old took the curatorial reins in selecting and arranging paintings, sharing their perspectives for wall text and audio guides, shaping exhibition design, leading exhibition tours, and giving press interviews.

This collaborative development process represented a bold departure for the Museum, pushing the boundaries of conventional museum practice. The exhibition emerged as a joyful celebration of children's competence and engagement with art. In this keynote, Nicole will present a behind-the-scenes look at the exhibition's development, evaluation findings, and what we learned from our young co-curators and their true potential!



PD FUNDING INFO

ARCQE's 14th Annual NCDC conference may be approved for PD funding, plus Release Time funding for a total of 19.5 hrs! Eligible registrants can apply to access the funds upon completion of ARCQE conference sessions.

Professional Development (PD) Funding may be available to eligible registrants to cover the cost of ARCQE conference registration, up to \$500/year for all Early Childhood Educators certified as Level 1, 2 or 3.

PD funding access has been expanded to all certified staff working in licensed child care programs, including **ECEs working in preschool programs**, and day home providers working in licensed family day home agencies.

Release time is now also available to ECEs so they can be paid while attending approved conferences; ECEs attending approved conferences are eligible to receive \$17.50 per hour (up to 45hrs per fiscal year).
